SVRP celebrates another successful year where students in Singapore contributed more than 9,000 volunteer hours to the cybersecurity community in 2020

Singapore, 24 March 2021 – The Student Volunteer & Recognition Programme (SVRP) Awards Ceremony was held on 24 March 2021 to recognise student volunteers for their contributions to the cybersecurity community. A total of 64 awards, including 6 Gold Awards, were given to student volunteers during the ceremony, recognising their passion, dedication, and contributions. The award recipients contributed at least 120 hours of volunteer work, with Gold Award recipients contributing at least 150 hours.
